#### **True Freedom in Christ**

<sup>31</sup> To the Jews who had believed him, Jesus said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. <sup>32</sup> Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." <sup>33</sup> They answered him, "We are Abraham's descendants and have never been slaves of anyone. How can you say that we shall be set free?" <sup>34</sup> Jesus replied, "I tell you the truth, everyone who sins is a slave to sin. <sup>35</sup> Now a slave has no permanent place in the family, but a son belongs to it forever. <sup>36</sup> So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:31-36)

It's Independence Day—the day we celebrate how free we are in the U.S.! But I'm going to say something strange for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July: People in America aren't really free. Just look around: Bitter partisanship and anger and bitterness—is that freedom? The constant struggle to have more money and stuff—is that freedom?



The fear of death that leads people to spend whatever possible just to stay alive a little longer—is that freedom? Pride over sin parading through the streets—is that freedom? Here's something we need to understand: You can live in the U.S. and still not be free. You can be free and still not be free.

At least that's what Jesus says. The Jews of his day were proud of their freedom too, just as you and I are to be Americans. They said, "We are Abraham's descendants and have never been slaves of anyone." Sounds very American, doesn't it? Listen to Jesus' response: "Very truly I tell you, everyone who sins is a slave to sin." Those Jews were wrong about freedom. The real master in our world isn't a foreign country, it's sin. "Everyone who sins is a slave to sin." Would you agree? When greed grabs your heart and controls your life, you're not free. When bitterness fills your mind and guides your tongue, you're not free. When alcohol or lust control your body, you're not free. "Everyone who sins is a slave to sin." Can we argue with that?

Here's the irony: We think that the more we can do what we want, the freer we are. We say: "It's a free country, so I can do whatever I want!" Do you know where that thought started? In the Garden of Eden. With a snake. "If you do what you want, if you eat this fruit, then you will be free, then you will have the knowledge of good and evil. The more you get to do what you want, the freer you are!" What's the truth? Having the freedom to do what I want makes me even more a slave to sin. In the U.S., we are free to drink as much as we want. Free to commit adultery as much as we want. Free to hoard as much money as we want. Free to hate and despise and boast as much as we want. But remember, you can be free and still not be free. The more you get what you want, the more a slave you are. "Very truly I tell you, everyone who sins is a slave to sin."



Listen to Jesus: "To the Jews who had believed him, Jesus said, 'If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." Getting my way isn't freedom—not in Jesus' eyes. Freedom doesn't come from a country or a political party. It comes from the truth. "The truth will set you free." The devil's lie is that freedom is doing what you want. The truth is that real freedom is trusting in what Jesus did for you.



- 1. Call to Order/Opening Devotion and Prayer by Reid Ehrisman at 7:03 pm
- 2. Admission of New Voting Members- Karen Grant motioned to approve Nickii Volk and Tiffany Pokorny as new voting members. Second by Brett Freudenburg. Motion carried.
- 3. Approval of Minutes Christy Schmidt motioned to approve the February 26, 2024, meeting minutes. Second by Deanna Anderson. Motion carried.

#### 4. Board Reports

- a. Treasurer's Report by Katie Schnitzler: Income continues to increase, but not at the same rate as the cost to operate. The operating debt balance is \$335,000+. The Stewardship Board continues to work closely with Tara from Elkhorn Valley Bank. Tara's recommendation is not to let the operating line of credit exceed a \$500,000 balance. The Stewardship Board has discussed different options for St. John's debt structure going forward. Current estimations project the operating debt to be at \$430,000 by the end of the fiscal year. Last June St. John qualified for the Employee Retention Credit (ERC), to be received in two different payments. The first payment was received in August of 2023. The second payment should be coming around October for \$39,000 plus interest. Karen Grant motioned to accept the treasurer's report. Second by Robin Whitney. Motion carried.
- b. <u>Trustees Report</u> by Todd Roberts: The new lawn mowing crew is doing a good job and stays in close communication with the trustees with any concerns. The trustees are assessing and planning accordingly for updates to the parsonage. The lighting project for the parking lot continues to go unfinished. Trustees are considering changing to a different business to complete the project.
- c. <u>Elders Report</u> by Dane Prauner: Transfers Out: Levi, Jaime, Miles, and Sterling Stueve to Our Savior Lutheran Church, Norfolk, NE; Aaron, Jenny, Alexis, Dylan, and Parker Anderson to Our Savior Lutheran Church, Norfolk, NE; Andrew Warneke to Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Dakota Dunes, SD; Jason, Lauren, Augustus, Hazel, and Griffen Freudenburg to Christ Lutheran Church in Norfolk, NE. Transfers In: Shellea and Chase "Joce" Olsufka from Zion Lutheran Church in Pierce, NE. Kevin Wedekind made a motion to accept the transfers in and out. Second by Gary Borgelt. Motion carried.
- d. <u>Evangelism Report</u> by Sara Anderson: One person has agreed to serve on the Evangelism board, and they have one other name as a possibility. Evangelism continues to work on planning details for a VBS rally at a home baseball event to encourage kids to sign up for VBS. They also continue to work on finalizing details for an Orphan Grain Train service opportunity during the last day of VBS.
- e. Parish Ed Report by Christy Schmidt: Preparations for VBS on July 21-25 are in full swing. There are currently 79 kids signed up for VBS and advertising continues to recruit more. The new Sunday school curriculum for next year has been purchased. The Sunday school digital download is a 4-quarter curriculum that can be spread out over two years. The VBS and Sunday school curriculums are produced by the same company, and both are

- doctrinally approved. David Werner will be stepping down from Parish Ed and Katey Huntley has been appointed by the chairman to complete his term. Deanna Anderson motioned to approve the appointment of Katey Huntley. Second by Kevin Wedekind. Motion carried.
- Parochial Ed Report by Nick Onnen: All current school staff are returning next year. The school theme for the 2024-2025 school year will be "Rooted in Christ." Student enrollment is up with 129 students (K-8) enrolled for the upcoming school year. Preschool enrollment is still not full. Our amazing preschool teacher, Miss Rave, would love to have a full classroom, so refer any preschoolers you may know to St. John. Currently, the congregation is supporting 52% of the school's cost which equates to approximately \$454,000. This number is down \$100,000 from 2 years ago. With the 2024-2025 tuition increase, IGNITE proceeds, and seeking outside churches to support their student at St. John, the cost to the congregation will continue to decrease. Our Savior and Grace Lutheran have already agreed to provide a financial contribution for their students at St. John. The Nebraska tax credits are another great opportunity to help support the school and the ELC. The gym floor situation is in a waiting period. The installation company continues to claim the broken downspouts were the cause of the floor issues. The downspouts have remained unchanged to monitor if weather conditions will create similar issues a year later. The gym floor is currently usable and no additional payments to the attorney are necessary at this time.
- g. <u>Early Learning Center</u> (ELC) Report by Deanna Anderson: The ELC board has 2 people who agreed to serve starting in the new fiscal year. A private donation was received to purchase items for a Jesus time box. The ELC lost a total of 19 kids due to rate increases. Recently thirteen staff attended an early childhood conference in Seward.
- h. <u>Stewardship Report</u> by Karen Grant: The Stewardship Board is very thankful to the congregation for the increase in giving during this time of debt. Thank you to the ELC board for all of the time they spent trying to make the best decision for the budget. Many thanks to Vince and Nick for putting in the extra leg work to reach out to other home churches of current students to help find financial support for tuition and for providing education for the available tax credit that can be beneficial to St. John Ministries. The Stewardship Board is very thankful for those who serve in all areas of St. John Ministries.

#### 6. New Business

a. 2024-2025 Proposed Budget by Katie Schnitzler: This current fiscal year's estimated budget deficit is almost -\$268,000. The actual current deficit is -\$67,000+ with four weeks left in the fiscal year. There was a lot of time spent planning for the 2024-2025 fiscal year budget. After publishing the new childcare rates effective July 2024, there were a total of 19 children withdrawn from the ELC. With the lost income, this left the estimated budget deficit for the 2024-2025 fiscal year at almost -\$159,000. The Council is proposing three options for the Voters to consider: 1) Leave the proposed budget as it is, 2) Agree to support \$100,000 of the ELC budget and then work backward to get to that number by making cuts, 3) Research the feasibility forming the ELC into its own 501(c)(3). Option #3 would allow different benefit packages to be offered to ELC staff, which has a big impact on the budget. The religious component of the ELC will remain a top priority even if it forms into a separate entity. Per recommendation from Pastor Weander, an ELC task force has been formed to research and obtain all information needed to determine the feasibility of ELC independence. If the Voters wish to pursue option #3, the Council is asking them to approve one-quarter of the budget to allow ample time for the ELC task force to study the feasibility of ELC independence. During this quarter, no raises will be awarded for all staff from July 1 to Sept. 30. The budget, ELC separation, and staff raises will be re-evaluated in September at a special Voters

- meeting. Ronald Buckendahl motioned to approve one quarter of the proposed budget and to research the feasibility of ELC independence. Second by Mark Baumgartel. Motion carried.
- b. Election of Officers A copy of the ballot with the names of elected officers is enclosed with a copy of the official minutes.
- c. Request to Extend Call to Tia Eriksen by Nick Onnen: Tia Eriksen has been teaching at St. John Lutheran School since August 2020. She recently completed the Lutheran teacher colloquy program making her eligible to receive a call for placement into the LCMS. Mark Baumgartel motioned that a Divine Call be extended to Tia Eriksen. Second by Deanna Anderson. Motion carried.
- d. Amendment to Name Filed with Secretary of State by Katie Schnitzler: The name filed with the Secretary of State reads "ST. JOHN'S LUTHERAN CHURCH, BATTLE CREEK, NEBRASKA" when it should be "ST. JOHN LUTHERAN CHURCH, BATTLE CREEK, NEBRASKA" with no "S". A motion is needed to file an amendment with the Secretary of State to remove the apostrophe "S" from the legal name. This change is necessary to accommodate any changes that may need to be made to the church's by-laws in the future. Brett Freudenburg made a motion to file the name amendment as stated above. Second by Robin Whitney. Motion carried.

#### 7. Other

- a. Call Process Update by Reid Ehrisman: There were a total of 64 congregational member survey responses received. The responses were reviewed and compiled to send to the district office. District President Rev. Richard Snow will review the information and schedule a pre-call meeting with our congregation to discuss the results and the next steps of the call process. That meeting time and date are to be determined.
- 8. Council Meeting Sunday, July 7, 2024, at 10:15 am (following worship)
- 9. Gary Borgelt motioned to adjourn the meeting. Second by Ronald Buckendahl. Motion carried.
- 10. Closing Prayer at 9:05 pm by Pastor Weander.

Additionally, we have started a New Members class with five participants, which is open to anyone interested in learning more about the Lutheran faith. John, Preston, and Pastor Joe lead this informative study in the parish hall classroom on Sunday at 10:30 am. The weekly lessons are also shared on YouTube for those that can't attend in person. Contact the church office for the link to the classes.

Stephen Ministries classes have begun with five participants in the first class. These people will then minister to those in need of God's guidance. Looking ahead to the fall, we plan on holding another teaching class for Stephen's Ministry. For those interested, contact Ginger Howser or Pastor Joe.

In addition, this fall we will begin a preaching series titled "Let's Go," which will align with our ministry planning and vision for the next two years. Watch for more information in the future on how you can be a part of shaping the vision at St. John Ministries.

"Aren't they the same?"


"No, hyper is energy out of control. You have a lot of energy but you can control it."

#### School Historical Cost to the Congregation

We deeply appreciate our committed leaders, volunteers, and supportive congregation who consistently meet challenges head-on. In response to mounting financial pressures, every facet of St. John Ministry's finances has undergone careful scrutiny. Transparency in our financial management is essential as we seek sustainable solutions for our ministry's future. Here's an overview of our school's financial outlook:

#### Where We Have Been

St. John's congregation has consistently risen to the challenge of funding the school ministry. Historically, the school remained "tuition free" up until the last two decades, meaning the congregation funded nearly 100% of the costs. In 2011, enrollment hit an all-time low, dating back to 1978, with 87 students in K-8. The focus then shifted to reviving the school and maintaining a healthy enrollment. As enrollment grew, so did expenses. Despite aggressive tuition increases, the congregation's cost for the school rose due to increased staffing, benefits, and inflation.


#### **Recent History**

Looking back, there is reason to be optimistic! In the 2013-14 school year, the school cost the congregation \$436,697. This cost peaked in 2021-22 at \$558,717, leaving an average annual increase of 3.5% between those years.

Over the last two years, we have seen a decrease in the cost to the congregation. Several factors contributed to this change:


- Tuition fees increased by nearly \$500 per child from 2022-23 to 2023-24.
- In 2023-24, the 3rd and 4th grades were temporarily combined, eliminating a salary.
- IGNITE provided alternate funding for the school in 2023-24.

These factors made the 2023-24 school year the lowest cost to the congregation since we began tracking in 2013-14. While separating the 3rd and 4th grades is anticipated for 2025-26, other factors will continue to contribute to a more manageable financial trajectory.



#### **Projecting Forward**

Over the last decade plus, the funding model of the school has changed. In 2011, the congregation funded roughly 90% of the costs. This past year, the congregation accounted for 50% of the cost, with IGNITE contributing a new, third piece of the pie.



Looking ahead to 2024-25, we'll add a fourth piece of the pie. A few neighboring churches have agreed to financially support their members who attend St. John, covering the "church portion" of their member families' costs. This could potentially contribute up to 4% of the cost.

Tuition fees for the first child have jumped, again, to nearly \$1,000 more than 2022-23. Pre-enrollment also indicates that there will likely be an increase in Preschool and K-8 enrollment. Enrollment increases multiplied by tuition increases yields more tuition income.

Lastly, with the passing of LB 1402, legislation at the state level has allowed school choice for the first time in Nebraska. The state has allocated \$10,000,000 for families in need to receive scholarships to the school of their choice. These scholarships could subsidize a greater portion of the cost to educate than what is currently charged for tuition, potentially decreasing the cost subsidized by the congregation for those families.

#### Conclusion

The nuts and bolts of the ministry are constantly being reviewed. Though our focus is solely Jesus, ensuring we're being conscientious stewards of our resources is essential. The intentionality of many dedicated servants, the support from our congregation, and the faithfulness of our God to provide for our ministry have sustained our school for 142 years. With His continued provision and guidance, we are confident in where he will lead in the years ahead.

## FAITH DEVELOPMENT IN INFANTS THROUGH PRESCHOOL AGE CHILDREN: THE ROLE OF FAMILIES & ST. JOHN ELC

Faith development in young children, spanning from infancy through preschool age, is a foundational process that shapes their spiritual understanding and identity. This critical period is marked by rapid cognitive, emotional, and social growth, making it an opportune time for nurturing faith. Families play a central role in guiding this early spiritual journey, as they provide the first and most influential context for faith experiences and teachings. Additionally, partnering with early learning centers, such as St. John Early Learning Center (ELC), can significantly enhance this developmental process by integrating developmentally appropriate practices into faith education.

Faith development begins even in infancy. During this stage, babies are not yet capable of understanding complex religious concepts, but they do start forming basic notions of trust, love, and security—core elements that underpin later faith experiences. The repetitive and nurturing interactions infants have with their caregivers lay the groundwork for their future spiritual outlook. When parents or guardians consistently respond to an infant's needs with love and care, it fosters a sense of safety and trust. This trust becomes a foundation upon which spiritual faith can be built. Families play a critical role by ensuring that infants feel loved and secure, modeling behaviors and attitudes that reflect their faith, such as kindness, patience, and reverence during daily activities. St. John ELC supports this by providing infants with sensory—rich environments that reflect aspects of faith, such as soft religious music, gentle prayer rituals, and visuals like pictures of religious figures, as well as infusing routine caregiving tasks with spiritual elements.

As children transition into toddlerhood, their cognitive and language skills begin to develop more rapidly. Toddlers are naturally curious and eager to explore their surroundings, imitating the behaviors and practices they observe in their family. This stage is crucial for introducing simple faith-related concepts and rituals. Families can incorporate faith-based routines, such as bedtime prayers, blessings before meals, and attending religious services, to help toddlers associate these practices with comfort and normalcy. Reading stories from religious texts or about moral lessons helps toddlers begin to understand basic concepts of their faith. St. John ELC enhances this by using play-based activities to introduce religious stories and concepts, such as reenacting parables with toys or using religious symbols in art projects, and establishing simple, consistent rituals within the classroom setting, like a morning prayer or singing religious songs.

By the time children reach preschool age, they are capable of more sophisticated thought processes. They start to ask questions about the world around them, including questions about faith, existence, and morality. Preschoolers can understand simple religious teachings and begin to form their own early beliefs. Families should be prepared to answer questions about faith in a simple, honest, and age-appropriate manner, encouraging a child's natural curiosity and helping them feel comfortable exploring their beliefs. Encouraging preschoolers to participate in

religious activities, such as singing, prayer, and community service, helps them feel included and reinforces the importance of faith in daily life. Teaching preschoolers about right and wrong through the lens of their faith helps them develop a moral compass guided by their spiritual beliefs. St. John ELC supports this stage by incorporating interactive learning activities that explore faith concepts, such as dramatizing Bible stories, creating faith-themed crafts, or participating in simple community service projects, and facilitating age-appropriate discussions about faith, encouraging preschoolers to ask questions and express their thoughts.

Partnering with St. John ELC can significantly enhance the faith development of young children by providing a cohesive and supportive environment that extends beyond the home. By collaborating with educators at St. John ELC, families can ensure that their children receive consistent faith-based education that is developmentally appropriate and engaging. Establishing regular communication between families and St. John ELC staff, aligning on shared goals for the child's spiritual growth, and coordinating consistent faith practices between home and the ELC are essential strategies for effective partnership. Encouraging family participation in ELC activities, such as volunteering for religious events, attending faith-based parent meetings, and participating in community service projects organized by St. John ELC, further strengthens this collaborative effort.

Faith development in infants through preschool age children is a multifaceted process that relies heavily on the influence of both families and early learning centers like St. John ELC. By integrating developmentally appropriate practices and fostering a strong partnership, families and St. John ELC can collaboratively nurture the spiritual growth of young children, laying a solid foundation for their lifelong faith journey. Through intentional practices, modeling, and open communication, both at home and in educational settings, children can develop a profound and enduring connection to their faith.
